When angels appear in Scripture, often some of the first words they speak are, "Fear not," or, "Do not be afraid." An example is the Gospel of Christmas Eve: "Do not be afraid," the angel said to the shepherds, "for behold, I proclaim to you good news of great joy that will be for all the people." The words, "Do not be afraid," tell us that people must be scared when these beings appear. But there's no reason to be afraid. Angels, despite appearances, mean no harm. The appearance of angels simply means that God is on the move.

When the angel Gabriel appears to Mary at the Annunciation (celebrated March 25) to announce that she would conceive of the Holy Spirit, his opening line is, "Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you." Maybe Gabriel knew that Mary would interpret his presence not as an indicator of some kind of trouble but as a sign that God was on the move.

God surely was on the move because the angel then tells Mary that she will soon bear a child who will be called, "the Son of the Most High.""I am the Lord's servant," she said in reply. "Let it be done for me as you have said." It is a "yes" that changed the world. Mary's "fiat" led to the birth of Jesus; the birth of Jesus led to the life of Jesus; the life of Jesus led to the death and resurrection of Jesus; the resurrection of Jesus led to the Church; and the birth of the Church led to our own baptisms into our discipleship of Jesus.

As we mark these last few days of the season of Advent, as the birth of the one for whom we wait is "oh-so-close," may we recommit ourselves to living like Jesus, loving like Jesus. Not only will that fulfill the will of God in our world, but it will be the best Christmas present we could possibly give! To God, to ourselves.
